The 17th witnessed the surge of the industrial revolution , which augmented Britain’s economic and military prowess, ushering in its era as a global hegemon and the “Empire on which the sun never sets” (Allen, 2017) . Through a literature review and analysis of qualitative data, we seek to understand the Impact to the historical, political, economic, cultural and education factors that contribute to the concentration of linguistic power in a limited number of languages. In addition, the work discusses the implications of this dominance for linguistic diversity cultural identity and access to information.

Efforts to achieve this balance require strategies that integrate globalization with the preservation of local languages, promoting multilingualism and linguistic inclusivity. By doing so, we can create a globally connected society that values and sustains its cultural diversity.

The dominance of global languages, such as English, is often seen as a vital tool for connecting in field like trade, technology, education, and diplomacy. The future course of English dominance will influence by variety of complex global issues, including economic, technical, political, educational, and cultural elements. The resuscitation of minority and regional languages via localization and cultural movements has the potential to rejuvenate these languages (Pennycook,2017).

As global languages spread through globalization and digital technologies, local languages face the threat of extinction. This endangers the cultural heritage they carry, reducing the world's linguistic diversity. Moreover, the dominance of global languages often excludes non-speakers, creating barriers in education and economic opportunities, which perpetuates inequalities.

The crisis lies in the imbalance between the benefits of global language dominance and the need to preserve linguistic and culture diversity. Addressing this issue requires strategies to promote multilingualism, integrate local languages into global platforms, and recognize the value of minority languages in sustaining cultural richness. Without such efforts, the growth of global languages may come at the cost of erasing invaluable aspects of human heritage.

II. METHOD

This study adopts a qualitative approach with descriptive-analytical method to examine the balance between global language dominance and local languages preservation. The research process begins data collection, which includes a comprehensive literature review to gather theoretical foundations and practical insights from academic journals, books, policy reports and relevant articles. This step enhances the credibility and validity of the research outcomes. Finally, the insights derived from the analysis are synthesized into actionable policy recommendations and practical strategies aimed at achieving a sustainable balance between global language preservation. This interconnected methodology ensures a holistic understanding of the research problem.

According to the citation of the interview with HPR, Linguist Dr. Salikoko Mufwene of the University of Chicago cautioned defining globalization must be understood on the local level and not simply as a universal phenomenon. Similarly Mufwene argued that globalization does not mean the imposition of English-only, instead, it can refer to the imposition of different language in various context of the

particular conditions and environment of the specific ecology. In the human terms, these ecological factors are largely economic. They allow population to operate viably in some languages and not in others.

Still, as Dr. Jan Blommaert, linguist at Tilburg University in the Netherlands, told the HPR, Small-scale studies are actually the key to understanding the impact of globalization, studying the language that people actually speak at home, rather than the languages that people use in transactions outside of their communities, can actually reveal the creative ways in which people their native languages.

This study that dominance of global languages, such as English, is not solely the result of single factor but is influenced by the complex interaction between history, politics, economy, culture and Education. The main findings from the data analysis are as follows:

1. Historic Influence

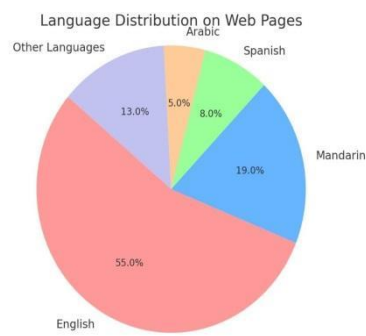
Colonialism played a significant role in the spread of global language. Colonial power introduced their languages as the primary languages in the territories they controlled. Several colonial powers played a significant role in the spread of global language English, Spanish and French. Here some of the major colonial powers and their impact on global language distribution such as the United Kingdom (English), the British Empire, at its height, controlled vast territories across Africa, Asia, North America, and the Pacific. English became a global language of trade, diplomacy, and education, with many former colonies continuing to use it as an official or second language. Spain (Spanish Empire) colonized much of Latin America, the Philippines, and parts of the Caribbean. Spanish is still widely spoken across these regions and remains one of the most spoken languages in the world. France (French) established colonies in Africa, the Caribbean, Southeast Asia, and the Pacific, French is still spoken in many of its former colonies, and it remains an official language in many international organizations, such as the United Nations. Portugal (Portuguese) colonial empire in South America (Especially Brazil), Africa, and Asia spread Portuguese, which remains the official language in several countries, including Brazil, Angola, Mozambique, Portugal and Timor Leste. The Netherlands (Dutch) Empire colonies, particularly in Southeast Asia (Indonesia), the Caribbean, and parts of Africa, spread the use of Dutch, which is still spoken in the Netherlands and its former colonies.

Global languages also reinforce the dominance of major countries in international trade agreements, countries proficient in global languages have easier access to economic opportunities and can influence global policies.

Overall, and economic global languages dominance facilities international interaction, it also exacerbates political and economic imbalances between major countries and those with more limited local languages.

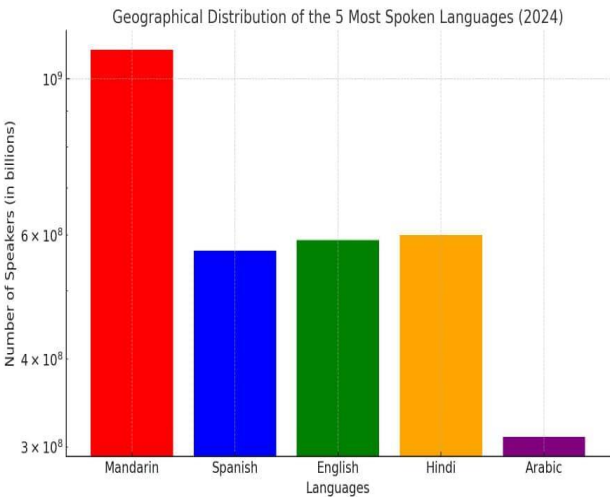
